Reflections

I've been asked to share some reflections from the past twenty-six years - over a quarter of a century - during which I have had the honor of being the Minister of Music here at Green Lake. This is not an easy task, but one worthy of undertaking. When I began my new role in the Fall of 1996 the world was a very different place, Green Lake church was very different, and I was very different. Change is a given. We cannot avoid it, but we can reflect and learn from the insights we've gained along the way as we encounter and adapt to changes in our world.

Last Fall we celebrated the 75th anniversary of the founding of Green Lake Church. Naturally a lot of focus was on events that took place during the first 25 years. But it is also helpful to articulate and appreciate the changes that have taken place over the most recent 26 years. Just to list a few, in no particular order, in the area of programming we have added children's choirs, a handbell choir, an inter-generational orchestra, and week-long summer Exploration programs for children. Enhancements to the building include replacing the shag carpeting in the Chapel with hard wood and adding a gas fireplace and beautiful lighting options, adding an elevator, expanding the platform in the sanctuary to better accommodate our orchestra and other programs, replacing the organ with one designed to enhance Green Lake's worship as it had evolved, adding new sound equipment, cameras, and a screen to help improve the quality of the worship experience for those in the sanctuary as well as for those joining from home on Sabbath mornings. I think we all enjoy the weekly Children's Story in worship, but when I started at Green Lake in 1996, that was not a component of our worship. Hard to imagine!

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Sometimes we can feel energized and excited by change, but it can be tempting to turn away and reject it, preferring the security of the known to the scar-

iness of the unknown. No matter how we react to changes happening around us, we are rarely able to stop them altogether. And after experiencing 26 years of changes here, I've noticed that on the other side of that change, once we've had time to adjust, we may even enjoy the very change we had feared.

I have been very blessed by my years at Green Lake. Many of you have become "family" to me in the best ways. While change is hard for all of us, I am ready to step back and pass the torch of music leadership, and I am excited for your future. With Pastor Kevin and Pastor Raven in place I believe you are well situated for moving forward to the next twenty-six years and that it will be an exciting time full of growth, new ideas, and, yes, change!

Pastor's Corner

Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up. ~James 4:10

A couple of years ago I listened to a conference by the Barna group that talked about the difference between intellectual humility and general humility. General humility is how you see yourself. Intellectual humility is how you see your knowledge, the knowledge that no matter how smart we are, we can always learn from others.

Intellectual humility relates to everyone. General humility means you have an accurate perception of your strengths as well as your weaknesses. This kind of humility has 4 practical behaviors.

1. When you are humble about your knowledge you will not be overconfident.

2. You won't become defensive when people have different perspectives than you.

- 3. You will be open to revision.
- 4. You will respect the viewpoint of others.

A Litmus test for Christians is how we relate to those that disagree with us. Throughout church history, millions of martyrs have been burned at the stake as a result of their "heretical" beliefs. I find it telling that in all of church history, no one has been punished as a heretic for being unloving. Jesus put the litmus test this way, "The world will know you are Christians by the way you love one another."

That's why when it comes to truth, honesty, humility, and love are so important.

1. Honesty, because it's a reflection of the heart. It is about good intentions.

It's David's prayer in Psalm 51. "Create in me a clean heart oh God, and renew a right spirit within me."

2. Humility, because even when we think we have the right belief, the right practice, and the right intention of the heart, we can still get things wrong. Humility recognizes this is part of the human condition.

3. Love, because it is the more excellent way. As 1st John 4:18 says, "there is no fear in love, perfect love casts out all fear." Allow the truth and humility to set you free.

The Bible isn't always clear. History informs us that we have not always interpreted well. In our disagreements about "disputable" matters we have not always demonstrated the love of Christ. Instead, we have sacrificed people on the altar of our own opinions.

"But he gives us more grace. That is why Scripture says: "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble."" James 4:6

God's School

School was just over for the day. My phone was ringing. "Hello, this is Ray Geigle. Remember me?" "Yes, I do." "Can you come up to Providence Hospital in Everett as soon as possible? Dad is experiencing kidney failure and wants to talk with the Cypress School principal." "I can make it by 4:00, OK?"

We had become acquainted with Ray and Eda Geigle. As head deacon and deaconess of Mt. Tabor SDA Church in Portland, OR, they had presided over five funeral dinners for my wife's aging family members. Ray had grown up at the old Mountlake Terrace School-Edmonds area and Eda at the old Ballard Church and Seattle Jr. Academy.

When I entered the hospital room, Ray introduced me to his dad, Reuben, and his two brothers. Reuben asked his sons to go to supper and to give him an hour with the Cypress principal.



"Mr. Dunston, are you aware that you are principal of God's School, a real miracle school? I don't have long to live and I want you to hear from my lips just how we got God's School." In the next few minutes, the following story spilled out!

Reuben had worked many years in the custodial department of the Edmonds School District. The superintendent talked to him one day telling him that the Cypress property then used for storage would soon go up for auction. He continued, "I know that you Adventists run schools and I'd like for your people to have a chance at this."

At that very time the Edmonds church had discussed an expansion project for additional classrooms and a gym at the Mountlake Terrace School for around \$600,000.

A meeting of the area Adventist churches was called.

The Cypress property with twenty classrooms, library-office, gym-kitchen all on ten secluded acres was available for less money (about \$390,000). Those men and women of faith and great vision voted to move out in faith and purchase the Cypress property.

Pastor Roger Ferris of Volunteer Park and Pastor Don Scully of Edmonds were asked to deliver the sealed bid the next morning. After having special prayer together, the pastors felt strongly impressed to raise the bid by \$5,000.

If the bid had not been raised, the Cypress property would have gone to another bidder. Another providential event happened. On overhearing an Adventist discussion about the Cypress miracle, a lady of another Christian entity looking for a property reported that the Mountlake Terrace School might be for sale, which led to a quick cash sale providing the down payment money for the Cypress property.

Here we come to an interesting wrinkle in the story reported to me in one of my last visits with Pastor Ferris. Since the pastors raised the bid on their own, they were held responsible to come up with the extra \$5,000. On inspecting the Cypress plant, they discovered thousands of old textbooks in mothballs. Resourceful Pastor Roger, and friends from Volunteer Park rented a truck, hauling many loads of books to a recycler raising the additional five grand.

I feel very blessed, indeed, to have known some of the "faith heroes" from the archives of the Cypress past and to have heard these precious memories from their lips.

Following are some of the heroes of Hebrews 11 (Cypress Version): Reuben Geigle, Roger and Ida Ferris, Wilbur and Sara Howell, Dorothea Searson.

George Neiswanger

George met his wife Irene in the elevator of the Smith Tower. They have been married for over 70 years. I asked them, "What is a key to a successful marriage?"

George gave a one word answer, "acceptance."

Irene and George come from different religious backgrounds. They decided early on that they wouldn't make the other join their church. They have been able to thrive within that religious pluralism because they are committed to respect and acceptance.

George said that wasn't always easy for him. He grew up believing that only 144,000 people would be saved, and that his church was the one true church. When you think all outsiders will be lost that can make you intense. However, as George visited his wife's church and met sincere wonderful people there, his theological certainty cracked. The circle of insiders expanded. Perhaps God could include the other denominations... For George, curiosity and acceptance are some of the keys to a meaningful life.

George shared a story about growing up in

the Great Depression era. His family like most families was poor. He qot used clothes from siblings and the pants would be patched and well George worn. wanted to play football like his



dad. One day while trying out for the team he was doing a sprint and his pants ripped. A little later one of the teachers brought another boy over and made him apologize for snickering. George didn't even hear the boy laugh, but this was a memory that stood out to him.
